<u>Private Prayer</u> will be offered at St Paul's this Sunday, after the service and every 1st Sunday of the month.

<u>Ascension Day</u> - this year falls on Thursday 9 May. Because it always falls in midweek, 40 days after Easter, it is frequently sidelined. Yet it is one of the four Principal Feasts of the Church alongside Christmas, Easter, and Pentecost. Indeed Pentecost finds its fullest meaning only in the light of the Ascension. There will be a sung Eucharist in **St Mary's at 7.00pm on 9 May** to celebrate the Ascension.



Readings: Isaiah 55. 1-11, Acts 10.44-end, John 15. 9-17

GOSPEL READING

John 15. 9-17

9As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love. 10If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. 11I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete.

12 'This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. 13No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. 14You are my friends if you do what I command you. 15I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father. 16You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name. 17I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another.

<u>FOR OUR ENVIRONMENT</u> - Blue-green algae, or cyanobacteria, come in many forms and have generally got a bad press, mainly because five of the 2,000 identified species can produce some of the deadliest toxins known to science.

At the same time, they are among the oldest organisms in the world, dating back 2.1bn years, and we owe them a debt of gratitude.

Cyanobacteria were the first organisms to use photosynthesis, turning carbon dioxide into oxygen. They are responsible for creating the oxygen-rich atmosphere that enabled life on Earth to flourish and humans to evolve.

In their untold trillions, in almost every environment where there is water, even on damp rocks in deserts, they continue this valuable service, keeping the atmosphere safe for mammals to breathe.

But in nutrient-rich water, created by farm waste or sewage released into rivers and lakes, blue-green algae multiply fast, especially in warm sunshine. This is dangerous in still waters where they form dense rafts of scum that deprive the waters below of oxygen, killing fish. In some circumstances they also create toxins that can poison animals and humans that drink it. Only laboratory tests can establish whether such algae blooms are toxic but anyone seeing one is advised to avoid it and report its presence.

FOR OUR WORLD – Of the 1.2 million people living in Karamoja, Uganda, more than 518,000 are facing <u>critical food insecurity</u>. Of these, 90,000 are at emergency levels without food to eat. 'For the first time in three years, all the nine districts of Karamoja are at crisis level or worse,' says Narem Sarah Kotido, Chairperson of the local District Disaster Management Committee.

We pray. Lift up all those who are facing hunger. Pray that they will have enough to eat. Pray for the rains and the harvests in Uganda. Ask God for healthy crop yields and that there will be plenty of food to provide good nutrition for communities.

FOR COMMUNITY – Traditionally, on May Day, 1st May, celebrations included dancing around the maypole and crowning a May Queen. The earliest recording of dancing around the Maypole was in Wales in the 14th century, and this tradition soon spread. We hope whatever you do this May Day weekend you have a wonderful time.
